Please find below a short brief concerning the manganese opportunity in Guinea and the steps taken today to get moving on it. Attached is an extract of the document from which the information was taken, it is in French and from a study conducted by the "Coopération Canadienne". The manganese section has been translated for your convenience.

1. MANGANESE IN GUINEA:

The Kaloum Peninsula harbors important manganese deposits. This mineralization was also evidenced in the form of a « smelling» deposit stretching over nearly four kilometers in the region of Beyla. In the central-western region of the country, between Telimélé and Kindia, limestone and manganese are found under the form of deposits in the *Cambro-Ordovician* rocks. Other types of mineralization were evidenced on Sieroumba leaves, Forécariah, Kindia (entrance of Dalaba) and Labé with average contents ranging from 0.1% to 1%.

DEVELOPING THE MANGANESE OPPORTUNITY FOR SABLE MINING

We have contacted today, Wednesday, the Secretary General and the chief of Staff of the Guinean Ministry as well as the national Direction of Mines to investigate further and get their support in developing the manganese opportunity and identify steps that can accelerate our obtaining the granting of exploration licenses before the second round of presidential elections.

FYI, the current mining code remains active since it was ratified by the Assembly and promulgated by then president Lansana Conté.

FOLLOW-UP STEPS:

A discussion between Mr. Alpha Mohamed CONDE, Mr. Andrew Groves, Mr. Bouba Sampil and Mr. Heine Van Niekerk should rapidly take place to agree on the process to follow and prepare the meeting that Mr. SAMPIL has obtained, for next Tuesday, with technicians in charge of the management of manganese deposits at the Ministry of Mines in Conakry. There is a short turnaround time as these contacts at the Ministry will be on holiday from the 11th of August 2010.

1. A letter of intent attesting Stable Mining's interest with regards to manganese deposits in Guinea
