

# Introduction by the Secretary-General

During fiscal year 1997, Croatia signed the ICSID Convention and Bosnia and Herzegovina also ratified it. Including Bosnia and Herzegovina, there are now 30 European countries that are ICSID members. Altogether, there were, at the close of the fiscal year, 141 signatory States of the Convention and 127 members countries of ICSID

Investment treaties continued to be concluded in significant numbers. ICSID staff have counted almost 1,200 such treaties so far. They have estimated that some 900 investment treaties provide for the settlement by ICSID arbitration of disputes arising out of investments covered by the treaties. Several recent investment laws contain similar references to ICSID arbitration. Some of the laws and many of the more recent treaties also provide for the possibility of submitting such disputes to arbitration under ICSID's Additional Facility Rules. Others provide for ad hoc arbitration under the Arbitration Rules of the United Nations Commission on International Trade Law, with the ICSID Secretary-General as the designated appointing authority of arbitrators.

These trends were, as in previous years, reflected in the Centre's caseload during 1997. Six new cases, all of them arbitration proceedings, were registered by the Secretary-General during this time, bringing the total number of cases registered to 44 and resulting in a record number of cases pending before the Centre. Four of these new cases have been brought to the Centre on the basis of provisions in investment treaties such as those mentioned above. They include the first two cases ever to be brought under the Centre's Addi-

tional Facility Rules, which are also the first two disputes to be submitted to arbitration under the investment provisions of the North American Free Trade Agreement. In another case, an award was rendered in a proceeding initiated under the provisions of an investment treaty. Five ICSID arbitral tribunals were constituted during the fiscal year, also a record for the Centre. In addition, the Centre received requests for the Secretary-General to act under arrangements designating him as the appointing authority of arbitrators. One such request was made not as part of an arbitration proceeding, but in the context of the constitution of a permanent review board for carrying out an infrastructure project, adding yet another dimension to the Centre's role in the settlement of disputes.

As in past years, the Centre also carried out research, publications and advisory work in the fields of arbitration and investment law. The staff continued its study of contemporary approaches to the legal treatment of foreign investment Two issues of the ICSID Review — Foreign Investment Law Journal were published during the fiscal year, featuring a commentary on the ICSID Convention. Staff efforts in the collection of investment laws and treaties were reflected in the publication of four new releases for the Centre's multivolume Investment Laws of the World and Investment Treaties. The new releases cover 85 treaties and nine investment laws. A consolidated list of investment treaties concluded from 1959 to 1996 was also published during the year. Advisory work included advice to countries upon their request on seven draft investment laws and on the draft arbitration provisions of ten international investment contracts. ICSID continued to participate in meetings of an Expert Group convened by the OECD to help develop the dispute-settlement provisions of the projected Multilateral Agreement on Investment.

In sum, 1997 was a very active and fruitful year for the Centre in which it further developed its significant role in the resolution of legal disputes relating to foreign investment and in the progressive development of the law governing such investment.

# Disputes before the Centre

In the past fiscal year, the Convention was signed and ratified by Bosnia and Herzegovina and signed by Croatia. At June 30, 1997, there were 141 signatory States of the Convention; of these, 127 had also ratified the Convention. A complete list of Contracting States and Other Signatories of the Convention as of June 30, 1997 appears in Annex 1.

During the year, there were fifteen cases before the Centre. Developments in these cases are summarized below.

(1) American Manufacturing & Trading, Inc. v. Republic of Zaire (Case ARB/93/1)

September 5, 1996—The expert, who was appointed by the Tribunal in June 1996 to prepare a report regarding damages, submits his report.

November 12, 1996—The Tribunal informs the parties that the proceeding is closed.

February 21, 1997—The Award is rendered.

(2) SEDITEX Engineering Beratungsgesellschaft für die Textilindustrie m.b.H. v. Government of Madagascar (Case CONC/94/1)

July 19, 1996—The Conciliation Commission draws up its report.

(3) Tradex Hellas S.A. v. Republic of Albania (Case ARB/94/2)

August 1, 1996—The Claimant files its further Observations on the Objections to Jurisdiction.

August 9, 1996—The Respondent files its further Observations on the Objections to Jurisdiction.

September 10, 1996—The Tribunal meets with the parties in London.

December 24, 1996—The Tribunal's decision upholding jurisdiction is rendered.

(4) Leaf Tobacco A. Michaelides S.A. and Greek Albanian Leaf Tobacco & Co. S.A. v. Republic of Albania (Case ARB/95/1)

January 30, 1997—Following a settlement agreed by the parties, the proceeding is discontinued at the request of the Claimants.

(5) Cable Television of Nevis, Ltd. and Cable Television of Nevis Holdings, Ltd. v. Federation of St. Kitts and Nevis (Case ARB/95/2)

July 1-2, 1996—The Tribunal meets with the parties in Barbados.

January 13, 1997—The Award declining jurisdiction is rendered.

(6) Antoine Goetz and others v. Republic of Burundi (Case ARB/95/3)

December 4, 1996—The Tribunal holds its first session with the parties in Paris.

March 4, 1997—The Claimants file their Memorial.

(T) Compañía del Desarrollo de Santa Elena S.A. v. Republic of Costa Rica (Case ARB/ 96/1)

May 28, 1997—The Tribunal is constituted. Its members are: Mr. L. Yves Fortier, C.C., Q.C. (Canadian), President, Professor Elihu Lauterpacht, Q.C. (British) and Professor Prosper Weil (French).

(8) Misima Mines Pty. Ltd. v. Independent State of Papua New Guinea (Case ARBI 96/2)

December 24, 1996—Dr. Gavan Griffith, Q.C. (Australian) accepts his appointment as Sole Arbitrator.

February 26, 1997—The Sole Arbitrator meets with the parties in Sydney.

April 9, 1997—The Claimant files its Points of Claim.

May 21, 1997—The Respondent files its Points of Defence.

June 10, 1997—The Sole Arbitrator meets with the parties in Sydney.

(9) Fedax N.V. v. Republic of Venezuela (Case ARB/96/3)

November 27, 1996—The Tribunal is constituted. Its members are: Professor Francisco Orrego Vicuña (Chilean), President, Professor Meir Heth (Israeli) and Mr. Roberts B. Owen (U.S.).

January 17-18, 1997—The Tribunal holds its first session with the parties in Washington, D.C.

The Respondent files a Memorial on its objections to jurisdiction.

February 26, 1997—The Claimant files its Counter-Memorial on the Respondent's objections to jurisdiction.

May 16, 1997—The Tribunal meets with the parties in Washington.

(10) Metalclad Corporation v. United Mexican States (Case ARB(AF)/97/1)

January 13, 1997—The Secretary-General registers a request for the institution of arbitration proceedings under the Additional Facility Arbitration Rules.

Pursuant to Article 3 of the Convention, the Centre maintains a Panel of Conciliators and a Panel of Arbitrators. Each Contracting State may designate to each Panel up to four persons, and the Chairman of the Administrative Council may designate up to ten persons to each Panel.

#### News from ICSID

This newsletter provides information on activities of the Centre and on disputes pending before ICSID, as well as articles on topics of current interest. During the fiscal year, two issues of *News from ICSID* were published: Vol. 13, No. 2 (Summer 1996) and Vol. 14, No. 1 (Winter 1997). The Summer 1996 issue included an article on ICSID Conciliation. The Winter 1997 issue included articles on Institutional and Legal Reform in Africa and on Institutional Discretion to Foster Arbitral Efficiency.

# ICSID Review—Foreign Investment Law Journal

Appearing twice yearly, the ICSID Review publishes materials on domestic and international law relating to foreign investments. The twenty-second (Fall 1996) and twenty-third (Spring 1997) issues of the Review were completed during the year. The Fall 1996 issue featured articles on U.S. "Helms-Burton" legislation and on the settlement of investment disputes in the energy sector. The Fall issue also included the first part of a commentary on Article 25 of the ICSID Convention, the final part of which was included in the Spring 1997 issue. This issue also included articles on the legal framework for foreign investment in Nepal and on the harmonization of business laws in francophone Africa.

# Investment Laws of the World

During the year, ICSID issued a new release (97-1) of its ten-volume collection of *Investment Laws of the World*. This release contained the texts of the basic investment legislation of Lithuania, the Maldives, Moldova, Myanmar and Papua New Guinea, and supplements related to such legislation of Mexico, Morocco, the Philippines and Ukraine. The collection now contains the text of the basic investment laws of some 126 countries.

#### **Investment Treaties**

In the course of the year, three new releases (Releases 96-3, 96-4 and 97-2) for the Centre's seven-volume collection of *Investment Treaties* were published. These releases contained the texts of 85 bilateral investment treaties concluded by 76 countries in the period 1991-1995. The collection now contains 640 bilateral investment treaties entered into by over 140 countries.

#### Other Publication Activities

Among the other publications issued by the Centre during the year was a new edition of *ICSID Cases*. The *ICSID Cases* brochure provides summary data on each of the cases registered by ICSID up to November 30, 1996 (e.g. dates of the commencement of proceedings, information on their outcomes, and names and nationalities of tribunal members). An expanded version of the *ICSID Bibliography* was also issued during the year. The *ICSID Bibliography* provides references to translations of

the ICSID Convention into 15 different languages and to some 300 articles and books dealing with ICSID and the ICSID Convention. In addition, a brochure listing signature dates, and, where applicable, entry into force dates of nearly 1,150 bilateral investment treaties (BITs) as well as publications on BITs, was issued by the Centre during the year.

#### **Advisory Activities**

The Secretariat continued to provide advice on arbitration and investment law. Such advisory activities included reviewing and commenting on draft investment laws and draft arbitration provisions of investment contracts, at the request of governments and foreign investors. During FY97, ICSID Secretariat staff provided such advice in respect of seven draft investment laws and on the draft arbitration provisions of 10 investment contracts.

#### **Conferences**

The Centre co-sponsored two arbitration conferences in fiscal year 1997. These included the thirteenth joint ICSID/American Arbitration Association/International Chamber of Commerce (ICC) International Court of Arbitration colloquium on international arbitration. This colloquium was held in New York on November 15, 1996. At the colloquium, which was devoted to the topic of the role of party autonomy in international arbitration, the Secretary-General presented a paper on recent developments in ICSID.

ICSID also co-sponsored with the Association of Arbitrators (Southern Africa), the ICC International Court of Arbitration and the London Court of International Arbitration a conference on the Resolution of International Trade and Investment Disputes in Africa. At the conference, which was held in Johannesburg on March 6-8, 1997, the Secretary-General contributed a keynote address on institutional and legal reform in Africa. The Secretary-General also contributed to the conference a paper on ICSID and Africa.

During the fiscal year, the Secretariat participated in three meetings of the Expert Group convened by the Organisation for Economic Co-operation and Development to help develop the dispute-settlement provisions of the projected Multilateral Agreement on Investment. The Secretariat also took part in the Fifth Meeting of the Free Trade Area of the Americas Working Group on Investment. The meeting took place in San José on September 2–3, 1996 and included a session at which the

ICSID Secretariat contributed a paper on ICSID and the Americas.

The Secretariat also participated in a Meeting on Funding of and Access to International Courts and Dispute Settlement Bodies, held in London on January 31–February 1, 1997. The meeting was organized jointly by the Programme on International Law and Sustainable Development of the Foundation for International Environmental Law and Development (FIELD), and the Center on International Cooperation, New York University.

At the 91st Annual Meeting of the American Society of International Law held in Washington, D.C. on April 9-12, 1997, the Secretariat contributed a paper on the International Legal Framework Governing Investment. The Secretariat participated in the XVI Inter-American Conference on Commercial Arbitration held in Rio de Janeiro on May 10-13, 1997 with a paper on ICSID arbitration mechanisms. The Secretariat also contributed a paper on ICSID and New Investment Instruments to the Intergovernmental Expert Meeting on Existing International Agreements on Investment and Their Development Dimensions, held in Geneva on May 28-30, 1997, under the auspices of the United Nations Conference on Trade and Development. The Secretary-General delivered a paper on the settlement of disputes at the 5th Economic Forum of the Organisation for Security and Cooperation in Europe, held in Prague on June 11-13, 1997.

# Thirtieth Annual Meeting of the Administrative Council

The Thirtieth Annual Meeting of the Administrative Council took place on October 1–3, 1996, in Washington, D.C. on the occasion of the Annual Meeting of the Board of Governors of the World Bank.

At the meeting, the Council considered a report by the Secretary-General on recent developments in ICSID and approved the Centre's 1996 Annual Report and its Budget for fiscal year 1997. The Resolutions adopted at the Meeting are set forth in Annex 2.

#### **Finance**

The Financial Statements of ICSID for fiscal year 1997 are set forth in Annex 3.

The administrative expenditures of ICSID were, again, entirely covered by the World Bank pursuant to the Memorandum of Administrative Arrangements concluded between the World Bank and ICSID in February 1967, and by income from the sale of publications.

It was therefore not necessary to assess any excess expenditures on Contracting States pursuant to Article 17 of the Convention.

ICSID expenditures relating to pending arbitration proceedings are borne by the parties in accordance with ICSID's Administrative and Financial Regulations.

#### **Notes to Financial Statements**

June 30, 1997 and June 30, 1996

#### Note 1-Organization

The International Bank for Reconstruction and Development (the Bank) and the International Centre for Settlement of Investment Disputes (the Centre) entered into Administrative Arrangements effective October 14, 1966. The Memorandum of Administrative Arrangements (the Memorandum) provides that, except to the extent that the Centre may be reimbursed by the parties to proceedings for fees and expenses of members of Conciliation Commissions, Arbitral Tribunals or ad hoc Committees, the Bank shall provide facilities and services, as described in Notes 2 and 3, to the Centre.

#### Note 2-Summary of Significant Accounting Policies

**Basis of Accounting:** The financial statements have been prepared in accordance with generally accepted accounting principles in the United States and with International Accounting Standards, and in accordance with the Memorandum.

Financial Statement Presentation: As of June 30, 1996, the Centre adopted the revised Standards for Financial Reporting set forth in the Statement of Financial Accounting Standards No. 117, "Financial Statements of Not-For-Profit-Organizations" (SFAS No. 117). As of July 1, 1996, the Centre changed its method of accounting for contributions received from the Bank to adopt the provision of Statement of Financial Accounting Standards No. 116, "Accounting for Contributions Received and Contributions Made" (SFAS No.116). The implementation of SFAS No. 116 resulted in the adoption of the Statement of Activities to reflect non-cash transactions related to the value of those services provided by the Bank which are identified as directly related to the Centre. There has been no effect on net assets previously reported as a result of this implementation, however prior year's financial statements are restated to conform to the current year presentation.

Value of services provided by the Bank and in-kind contributions: The value of services provided by the Bank is determined by the fair value of these services and is recorded by the Centre as in-kind contributions and also as expenses of the Centre.

#### Annex 3 (continued)

The Bank provides the following facilities and services to the Centre:

- (1) the services of staff members and consultants; and
- (2) other administrative services and facilities, such as travel, communications, office accommodations, furniture, equipment, supplies and printing.

Revenue recognition from arbitration proceedings: The Centre does not have resources of its own. The Centre's expenses attributable to arbitration proceedings are borne by the parties in accordance with the Centre's Administrative and Financial Regulations. In accordance with these Regulations, the Secretary-General calls on the parties to make advance deposits with the Centre from time to time to defray these expenses. Accordingly, the Centre recognizes revenues during the period of and to the extent of expenses incurred related to arbitration proceedings. If, after the completion of an arbitration proceeding, it is determined that there is a cash surplus, such surplus shall be refunded to the parties in proportion to the amounts advanced to the Centre.
